Over the years, many staff members have generously sacrificed their days off from full-time employment to assist in spaying and neutering efforts. Their patience and collaboration during our relocation efforts have been commendable, as we collectively managed to establish a new clinic space that prioritizes safety, cleanliness, and operational efficiency.

Since our clinic began operations, we have spayed or neutered 7,865 cats as of the end of August. We can see the profound impact our clinic has on the community and we are committed to diligently continue our scheduling in order to serve our community to the best of our abilities. Our clinic not only benefits animals, but also helps families. Through spaying and neutering, pets can remain in their homes, ensuring their well-being and the risk of reproductive diseases is much reduced. By preventing unplanned litters, we alleviate stress for families who love their pets. And in the long term, we and advocate for spaying and neutering to curb the population of unwanted, abandoned, and homeless animals.

Did you see Stewie on the CBS-5 Pet Segment in August? Stewie was surrendered by his owner due to his need for expensive medical care for his chronic dry eyes. Even though his yearly care became too much, he was always much loved. The owner made the difficult decision to give Stewie a chance at the stress-free life he deserves. And Stewie did find the best home in Sackets Harbor, with a family with both poodle and eye care experience!





Charlie and Millie were transferred from another organization, the Oswego City Animal Shelter! After a previous adoption, we had a foster home available with no pending intakes for kittens. Charlie and Millie were juveniles in the shelter who could best benefit from a foster home environment, with lots of enrichment, socialization, and one-on-one care. They were adopted at the beginning of September!

Jasmine and her litter mates were surrendered back in February due to a common issue: the lack of access to affordable spay and neuter services. Managing the care of two cats can already be challenging, but imagine the struggle of handling nine after one of the adults gave birth to a litter of seven! The family did provide everything they needed but it was too much to have that many cats long-term. Jasmine has since found a great home and her 4 sisters are still looking!





Little baby Chlli was a spicy orange kitten surrendered during a clinic. She was a lonely abandoned singleton with no mom or other cats around her. She was brought in by a caring person and it was clear that she needed some love and care. Despite her spiciness, there was an instant connection with one of our clinic staff members and Chili had a foster home and future forever home before her paperwork was even submitted into the system!
